Crowcombe Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 3rd September 2015 at Church House. The full draft minutes are available on the website for more detailed information, but this report highlights some of the key points covered.

Village Agent: The new village agent for Crowcombe, Debbie Dennis, introduced herself and gave a brief summary of her role, organised through the Community Council for Somerset, which is to provide help and support for vulnerable people within the village. She works on a referral basis so the word needs to be spread amongst the village that she is here to help and what assistance is on offer.

District Councillor's Report : Anthony Trollope-Bellew reported that Somerset (6 authorities) and Devon (11 authorities) are submitting a joint bid to government to be granted devolved powers. The papermill at Watchet is under threat of closure with 179 employees, including a large proportion of the area's volunteer firefighters. There has been a cut of £313,000 in Hinkley Point B funding which negates the savings made by the amalgamation of services for west Somerset with Taunton Deane. There are hopes of a positive announcement in October with regard to joint EDF/ Chinese funding for Hinkley Point C to coincide with a state visit by the President of China.

Highways: The finger post at the far end of the village has been re-erected. Most of the rotten wooden 30mph sign posts have now been replaced with metal poles.

Bus Shelter Update: It is proving hard to obtain the three quotes for a replacement bus shelter that have been requested by the insurance company but the Council is hopeful that progress will be made before the winter weather sets in.

Buttercross and Hagley Benches: Ben German has very kindly offered to wash and wax the two benches at Buttercross and Hagley. This will require their removal for a short period of time.

Super Fast Broadband: No progress has been made with the exchange yet although British Telecom have promised that Super Fast Broadband will be in Crowcombe by the end of September. Watch this space!

Finances to Date : Balances were : Current a/c 38109.14, Deposit a/ac £3222.67, Amenities a/c £2681.84. Balance £14,013.65

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Thursday 5th November at Church House, commencing at 7.30pm and the agenda will be available (online and on the parish notice board) approximately one week prior to the meeting.

The funding of the AONB remains our principal concern at a time when both the County Council and District Councils finances are under pressure. We trust that they will continue to honour their responsibilities but in order to help the AONB Service we have agreed to make a contribution to the core funding of the Service to help safeguard the ranger service that is so important for the hills.

Our plans for changes to the Crowcombe Park Gate car park are progressing slowly as does our scheme for a footpath beside the A39 at Kilve. The complex nature of the Quantocks means that a lot of different people need to be consulted. The good news is that all our young Elm trees are flourishing although it will be a long time before we know whether they are truly disease resistant.

Our recent talk on Owls provided a fascinating insight into the life of Barn Owls and the pressures on their lifestyle and habitat. The loss of so many old barns is a problem but they seem quite happy to use man-made nesting boxes. They are present around the Quantocks and we hope that they will remain so.

Report from West Somerset Council by Anthony Trollope-Bellew

Those of you who read the West Somerset Free Press will have seen that there are even greater problems than was originally thought with next year's budget. Not only is the contribution from Hinkley Point" B" being cut but also the rebate that is due for 2010-2013 is expected to be paid by WSC. This is grossly unfair as WSC never received this money. There may be movement on this but if there is none WSC will be approximately £1.5 million worse off. What is very frustrating is this is all totally outside WSC's control. Provision had been made for a rebate but nobody could have expected it to be so large.

Officers at WSC, as part of work on next year's budget, are attempting to do what has never been done by any local authority. That is break down exactly what it costs to open the doors, carry out statutory duties and how much is then left to spend on discretionary areas. It sounds simple but we have been advised not to do it because it will drive us mad. We have to carry out the statutory duties but it is not laid down to what standard and in many areas nobody knows.

Devolution is the buzz word in local government at the moment. This means decisions being made in the town hall rather than Whitehall. Cornwall is the first rural area to apply even though proposals are meant to cover more than one authority. A joint application has been put in for Somerset and Devon covering the two county councils, two unitaries and all the districts. This does not include any plans for a mayor to cover the two counties. We wait to hear whether this is successful.

The Prime Minister of China is visiting this country this month. Hopefully this will be used as a platform to sign an agreement on Hinkley Point "C". EDF hope that the Chinese will be involved both financially and technologically. So it will be a setback if the Prime Minister's aeroplane takes off for Beijing without an agreement being signed. However it may not be terminal for the project.

Hiring 2016 - & Grant Applications

Much appreciated customers of Church House need to know of some changes - improvements, we hope - in booking procedures that are being introduced to apply to 2016 and beyond:

In the past, booking of Church House for the following year has opened in October for villagers - and in November for non-villagers. This tradition is unhelpful for customers who need to make their arrangements well in advance, e.g. for weddings and art exhibitions.

From now onwards, a booking of Church House can be made at any time: e.g. now for a date in 2017. If hire fees for the year in question are not yet published when the booking made, then current prices will apply. The hire fee is of course due at the time of booking.

We are also introducing more flexibility for Artist Exhibitions:

An Exhibition may start on any day of the week and be for as many days as the Artist wishes, but subject to a minimum of 4 days. For Exhibitions to last less than a week, an economical daily rate is available.

Hire Fees for 2016 are now published and posted in the Shop: Villagers continue to receive a c.33% discount. Villagers can hire the Meeting Room for half a day @ £12. The whole building can be hired for a full day, e.g. for a family party, at £62 in the summer and £77 in the winter.

Crowcombe villagers have over the past year been wonderfully supportive of our Fabric Conservation plans. You have raised £22,000 for the project.

10 formal grant applications have now been submitted. To date we have been successful with the Garfield Weston Foundation who have awarded us £5.000 - and unsuccessful with the Hinkley Point Community Impact Mitigation Fund. This was somewhat of a long shot. Proof of impact, given Crowcombe's distance from Hinkley Point, was not easy to demonstrate!

We should know our fate for all the outstanding applications by Christmas. For most of them, we are going for a £22,000 matched funding grant. The total sum we need for the lime mortar re-pointing of the entire building, inclusive of the Pound, is £65,000

CIEH Level 2 Award in Food Safety in Catering (outdoors) has been designed to address the food safety needs of the catering and hospitality sector but adding the additions of the

As Forest School Leaders, Children's workers, Scouts, Guides, voluntary helpers, food handlers, this training would be good for you as you have the responsibility to keep children, young people and adults safe. The qualification is designed to give an appreciation of good hygiene practice.

There is emphasis on the 4 Cs (chilling, cooking, cleaning, contamination). Monitoring controls, corrective actions and methods of reporting are examined as part of a food safety management system. It is aimed at those of you who perform a varied food handler's role with some guidance and supervision.

The training is run by Sarah Blake who initially established this course with Lantra Awards, but now delivers this using the nationally recognised level two qualification.

A multiple - choice test will conclude at the end of the course. After successful completion candidates will receive a certificate from the CIEH and a 'Blake Training' certificate, personalising the additional outdoor food safety topics covered.

The aim of the day is to combine the theory of food safety with the practical skills of cooking lunch in the outdoors developing good practice guidelines in hopefully a fun, interactive

- Microbes Where are they "lurking"?
- Illnesses linked to food and the outdoors



SUPPORT FOR OUR CHURCH ORGAN

Our village church organ needs your support!

We are most fortunate to possess a fine organ in Crowcombe Church which is well used and much appreciated at all our unday services. It also features prominently at weddings; some baptisms, and funerals; at Christmas Carol services, Easter, Harvest and Remembrance and much else.

Our organ was originally built by Foster and Andrews and then adapted by Osmunds of Taunton in 1931. It is a good instrument, well worth preserving.

Sadly however, it is in need of a major restoration. It has become very dirty inside, so much so that the way it functions and sounds is being affected. Some parts – especially those made of wood or leather – are also now extremely worn and in urgent need of replacement; three of the notes already do not work and others are sticking. Without restoration, it will continue to deteriorate. It needs to be dismantled, taken away to be cleaned and restored by an organ specialist and then reassembled. All of this will cost at least £6,000 and we would like us as a village and parish community to raise the money over the next 18 months to two years.

We have started to raise money by collecting donations at some services; offering books for sale in the church; selling cakes, jams, knitwear and jewellery after services and at various table-top events; and through planning special events - the first being a string quartet concert on Saturday 17th at 7.30pm with light refreshments. One of the Clayhanger Quartet is Suzie Fawden (viola); and tickets can be obtained from the Crowcombe Village Shop or Suzie herself. Please see the separate advert.

We hope you will be pleased to support this church and community project through the different activities underway and future events.
