Hinkley Point "C": the ongoing saga, at the beginning of the year I was 98% confident that this would proceed now I am only 45% certain. The resignation of the finance director of EDF, the drop in EDF's share price so that now the company is worth less than it will cost to build Hinkley Point "C", the continued procrastination on making the Final Investment Decision and the application to the French government by EDF for £2 billion of funding has led to my drop in confidence. I only know what I have read in the newspapers but it appears that the figures do not stack up and if the project proceeds it will be a triumph of political will over economics. I hope I am wrong as many local small businesses have invested time and money in gaining contracts for the construction period.

A rather gloomy report I am afraid. As usual please do not hesitate to contact me if you think I can help in any way.

Report from Anthony Trollope-Bellew on West Somerset Council.

WSC's budget: a balanced budget has been achieved and was passed at full Council at the end of February. This was quite an achievement as £600,000 was needed to be saved from a budget of just over £4 million. Unfortunately we have had to cut grants we give to local voluntary bodies. But we are funding an investigation of a scheme to set up a local lottery or something similar to fund local organisations. Also the grant to the Quantock Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty had to be cut as well. Nobody wanted to carry out these savings but it was necessary to protect frontline services. Hopefully you will not notice any difference in services.

When we had finalised the budget but it had not gone to full Council government suddenly produced an extra £170,000 for this coming year and £70,000 in 2017/18. When funding for local authorities was originally brought forward for next year the rural areas, which are already underfunded compared to the urban ones, were hit harder. Fortunately the MPs from the Rural Fairer Funding Group made it clear to government that they would not support this further unfairness. So more money was found through the Rural Services Delivery Grant. I was delighted when I was given this news but the delight was short lived as within a couple of days I was warned that a probable appeal by the hospitals to change their business rates status would lead to WSC having to refund £320,000. So it was only provident to allocate the extra £240,000 to a reserve to fund this probable repayment.

The future of West Somerset Council is in grave doubt. We think we can set a balanced budget for 2017/18 but the predictions for April 2018 looks almost impossible. I led a delegation to see the Minister for local government in January to try and get funding to replace what we had lost from the re-rating of Hinkley Point "B". Unfortunately we were told that no funding was available and that we should merge with another authority. Following that officers are now working on business cases for West Somerset remaining independent or whether there is no alternative to merger. I will do all I can to save West Somerset as a sovereign and independent council as I believe the people of West Somerset are best served by their own council at Williton rather than one based in Taunton or Bridgwater. I accept that the chances of success are less than 50-50. I will keep you informed.

NEWS

It is hard to imagine the now abandoned Hoar Oak Cottage, tucked away in a beautiful Exmoor valley and home to shepherd families for hundreds of years. In February, Betty Baldwin gave us a most interesting talk entitled 'Searching for the Hoar Oak Families'. Abandoned in 1950 until conserved as a heritage site in 2014, it lies well away from roads and other buildings and offers a rare chance to imagine what a remote life on Exmoor might have been in days gone by.

It was in the early 1800s that John Knight, a wealthy entrepreneur from the Midlands purchased the Royal Forest of Exmoor and set about an agricultural experiment. The Knights were great fans of hardy Scottish stock and purchased Scottish sheep, sheep dogs and cattle to populate this wild yet luscious area. For centuries Hoar Oak Cottage was home to shepherd families together with dogs, chickens, cattle etc. Far from civilization they were almost self-supporting, and, as it says in a poem read to us by Betty, Hoar Oak had;

'three bedrooms, a privy, a kitchen range, no water laid on but a tap nearby, (that was the place where it never ran dry) whilst shepherding, living as one with their flock.'

A family would live there until the shepherd died and then, (there being no welfare state), the family disappeared and a new shepherd and family appeared. Most of what we know of the inhabitants of Hoar Oak Cottage is through the many descendants of the Shepherds who lived there throughout the years: the Vellacotts, the Hobbs, the Littles, the Antells and Sarah and James Maxwell-Johnstone all lived there over the years. Betty herself was descended from the Maxwell-Johnstones who had thirteen children, ten of whom were born at Hoar Oak Cottage

In March we had a Crochet Workshop with Debbie Wilcox. Debbie arrived with armfuls of her own work to show us and (her words not mine) described herself as a Happy Hooker. With great patience she proceeded to teach us crochet. Some of us got it, some of us didn't! Never mind it was fun trying and will be useful to teach the grandchildren.

Crowcombe and Stogumber Federated Primary Schools Spring Term Summary

Our theme this term has been "Structure", and on the calendar it looked to be pretty brief. Well, it's certainly been crammed! Within class, just some of the ways that we have approached the topic have been by painting murals of 3D shape onto the walls, studying the features and functions of the parts of a plant, modelling volcanoes, sculpting from clay and cardboard, and writing novellas in chapters! Two contrasting aspects of structure also appear in the brilliant weekly yoga sessions delivered by Penny Phillips, and in the (now nozzle-jammed!) 3D printer, which the staff will hopefully have figured out by next term!

Chinese New Year, World Book Day and Sports Relief played their part in the term, with the children learning dragon and parasol dances, calligraphy, haikus and construction skills. Our Sports Relief WOW day was a great success, with all of our pupils working together at Crowcombe to design, build, decorate and test drive life sized gokarts made from recycled materials. Each of the ten vehicles performed brilliantly, carrying drivers aged 4 to 11 safely through the test tracks. Thanks to Chris Locke and Eric Russell our pit crew, for their awesome mechanical support! The go-kart day was a superb conclusion to a series of Design & Technology tasks that our pupils have taken on this term, from miniature buggy making to Roman chariot construction and even a workshop day spent building huge gliders under the guidance of a real aerospace engineer, Elliot Talbott (Lucius and Sophia' dad) from Facebook's aviation wing! Structure was also the theme of our other WOW day, a whole school adventure on the Quantock ridge. In mixed age groups, the children took on challenges ranging from abseiling mountain rescue scenarios (with a real Exmoor Mountain Rescue team), egg -xtreme catapulting, fairy house construction, tower building and wind and stone sculpting! In the afternoon the children split into infants and juniors to take on a treasure hunt and an orienteering challenge.

Our Code club members, aided by James Russell, have begun designing their robots and are busy experimenting with their arduino chips to help their frankenbot make its first faltering movements. Our young journalists have put together yet another brilliant newsletter, with the support of Laura Hogevold, who is also working with a group of our talented year sixes. Louise Ford, Ellie Furner (our brilliant student teacher) and Penny Phillips have brought gardening club back to life and fresh shoots are now bursting out at Crowcombe! Our choir goes from strength to strength and is at such capacity that Helen Napper has formed a 'youth section' to train hopefuls in the wings! Some of our more proactive and caring children have set up lunchtime maths and Lego clubs to support younger children.

It has been a brilliant term for sport. Parents, governors and staff have shared the mantle of responsibility for overseeing our squads and this has enabled us to attend more competitions. Crowcombe Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Thursday 3rd March 2016 at Church House. The full draft minutes are available on the website for a more detailed description of events, but this report highlights some of the key points covered.

Councillor co-option: Mr Jim Laver was co-opted to the Parish Council bringing the Parish Council back up to its full compliment of 7 councillors.

Police Matters: a report was submitted by PCSO Bolton:

Remember that this is the time of year when there are break ins on outbuildings / sheds -be aware!

Recorded crime statistics for the whole beat area (Minehead, Williton and Wellington) 2015 v 2016:

408 total recorded crimes, just under 10% down year on year

ASB 190 = 42% down on last year CRIME 253 = 20% down on last year GENERAL 569 = 145 down on last year PUBLIC SAFETY etc 831 = 13% down on last year TRANSPORTATION 386 = 16% down on last year

County Councillor's Report : Cllr Christine Lawrence distributed a press release from Somerset CC outlining an ambitious vision for the county that included, amongst other things, the desire to create a Somerset University and a garden town. Work is also under way exploring devolution which, even if full devolution does not occur, has resulted in cooperation between authorities and triggering ways to work together and save money.

A budget of £75 million has been agreed for investment in roads (with a large proportion towards the A358 / A303 improvements), schools and economic development and news was received last week of an additional £2.9million from central government which will be invested in key frontline services, highways and to replenish reserves.

Finances to Date : The clerk reported that the bank balance total held by the council as of 29/1/16 to be £14,698.11 consisting of £8792.24 in the current account, £3223.48 in the deposit account and £2682.39 in the amenities account.

Parish Path Liaison Officer: Following Mr and Mrs Wilson retiring from the role, Sarah Evelyn has agreed to take over as Parish Path Liaison Officer for Crowcombe. Thanks were given to Mr and Mrs Wilson for the time and effort they have put into this over the past six years.
