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

We were delighted to welcome Hilary Eldridge (and her sheepdog 'Flash' plus husband) to our June meeting when she gave a talk entitled 'Counting Sheep'. She told us about her life, leading up to her love of sheep and sheep dogs.

Following a trouble shooting job at Telecom (her highlights seemed to be riding to meetings in a chauffeur driven limo) and a spell working at an eccentric Exmoor hotel (with even more eccentric guests and staff) Hilary and her husband and family were able to afford a small holding near Dulverton, keeping sheep and cattle, having trained in their care beforehand. We were interested to hear that a milking ewe can produce up to 3 pints of milk a day and Hilary provided a well known local ice cream company with sheep's milk for their products. Peacocks and doves also joined the family firm. Finally we were introduced to 'Flash', a hard working sheep dog who demonstrated his skills to the envy of all of us who were dog owners.!

W.I.Invited to Buckingham Palace.

Beryl Ayres, fresh from her visit to the Centenary W.I. Garden Party at the Palace came to our meeting in her Palace gear resplendent with hat! Apparently her main worry was not how to behave when in the presence of royalty, but rather, how on earth to keep her hat on her head in the very high wind that was blowing at the time! Beryl told us that in being chosen to attend on behalf of Crowcombe W.I. she had fulfilled one of her lifelong ambitions. Doesn't this just show the opportunities open to us in the W.I ? Well done Beryl !

For our **July Meeting** we had two speakers. First Andrew Harrison gave us a most interesting illustrated talk on Mount Athos, (otherwise known as the Holy Mountain.) I for one did not even know where it was, let alone anything about it!

Mount Athos is the most easterly peninsular at the tip of Greece, and covers an area some 60 kilometers long. Andrew told us that 'today Athos includes 20 monasteries and 700 houses or hermitages which are home to over 1000 monks. Some even live in cells which cling to the cliff face rising steeply above the sea.. In no circumstances are women allowed even to visit, so don't get your hopes up girls! The monks occupy their time when not at their religious duties either farming or looking after their homesteads. They are not entirely self supporting and much of the money they produce from their work is used to buy necessities from abroad.

Our second speaker was Jenny Barham from Merridge W.I. Jenny was our delegate for the Centinary AGM. which was held at the Albert Hall and had put forward our decision regarding this year's resolution. We at Crowcombe W.I. had not previously met her. She wanted to explain to us why our chosen resolution had not been voted in. It seems there were very strong feelings expressed, both for and against at the meeting, and the matter was left to be decided at a later date. It is nice to think that our feelings are given consideration.

Jenny brought with her some wreaths she had made ahead of time for Christmas and, as we found her both charming and talented, we had no hesitation in booking her as one of our speakers for next year.

Leaving letter from the Reverend Valerie Plumb

Saying goodbye doesn't mean anything. It's the time we spent together that matters!

In the beginning ...

I've always hated saying goodbye; especially the kind that makes one's chest ache, brow furrow and eyes redden with held back tears. By the time you read this letter I would have done quite few of them with more yet to come. But as painful as this experience is I am constantly thinking about how blessed am I to have had something so wonderful here that it makes saying goodbye so hard!

It seems like only yesterday that I was writing my introduction letter to you as your new Rector, I can still remember all the excitement and energy from not just starting a new job but also coming back to Somerset, to be with my family and friends once again.

I am reminded of the night of my installation at Crowcombe Court when surrounded by new and old parishioners all celebrating my arrival, then I suddenly felt the arms of my mother around me as she whispered in my ear, "It's good to have you home"

Mum was so thrilled to have me back, because she knew that the nature of my work meant that I could never settle anywhere for too long and that sooner or later the time would come to move on.

So where am I going?

I am going to the Oxford Diocese, interestingly it is the largest diocese in the country sporting 4 Bishops! I will be working on the East side of the diocese in the Buckingham Archdeaconry. My place of residence will be a newly renovated diocesan house in a lovely little country village called Ludgershall, set in Rural Aylesbury.

What am I going to do?

My Job title is 'Area Dean for Rural Mission and Development', it means that I will do two things, firstly the work of an Area Dean which is someone who works with the Bishop and Archdeacon to act as a strategic leader for four different deaneries; Mursley, Buckingham, Claydon and Western Aylesbury, a big part of that role is looking after the buildings, clergy, linking up resources and ensuring working structures are in good order. However, and this is the interesting bit, this is also a specialised role that actually needs some creative thinking to actually rethink some of those structures, vision to re-imagine how we can do church differently and most importantly an opportunity to get churches to reflect on their current context with a focus for mission and outreach. It's a pioneering role and the first of its kind in the Oxford diocese; it's a chance for me to help redefine rural church for the future!

As Christians its ever so easy to get caught up with doing what we think God wants us to do that we often forget to allow him the chance to properly grow us into the people he wants us to be. When I reflect back on my own ministry here over these last 6 years I see no straight neat lines, instead I see lots of untidy scribbles. I see life, and I am glad about it. And in that I life I see you and all the many sketches we have drawn together.

Finally, I would like to say a special thank you to all who have ministered alongside me, ordained and lay, and all who have given their time and energy to the support our church, our parish and our people.

It has been an absolute privilege and pleasure to have served you as your Rector. And to conclude, as my mother always reminded me to say after a happy stay, "Thank you for having me."

Let me leave you with my favourite ever prayer, pray it regularly; it will help keep you grounded!

Report from West Somerset Council by Anthony Trollope-Bellew.

I have now been the leader of West Somerset Council for just over two months. It has been a very interesting experience but so far I have not encountered anything untoward. The major problem is funding from April next year. It was thought that we would have to save £300,000 but with the re-rating of Hinkley Point "B" this has risen to nearly £500,000. This is a major undertaking from a budget of just under £5 million. In fact the reduction in income is £313,000 but £119,000 had been allowed for in the predicted budget.

Being leader entails more travel. I have been to London twice in the last couple of months to represent West Somerset. Also I have been to Harrogate for the Local Government Association conference. At Harrogate I raised with the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, Greg Clark, the difficulties that the re-rating of Hinkley Point "B" has caused to West Somerset. Also I managed to have a word with Mark Francois, the Minister of State, about the inequity of the funding to all rural local authorities. I wait to see what effect these conversations will have. Being the leader of a Conservative controlled authority unfortunately does not give easy access to Conservative government ministers.

Now that the unification of the two officer teams from West Somerset and Taunton Deane has been completed we have embarked on the next stage which is called transition. This entails a complete look at how all services are delivered with a view to improving delivery at a lower cost. This may seem too good to be true but I am sure we will be able to deliver it to some extent.

Last month I had a meeting with EDF's senior man in England. I am now very certain that Hinkley Point "C" will proceed. I am not allowed to divulge how much but EDF have already spent a great deal of money on Hinkley. Now even though the site is in temporary care and maintenance they continue to spend a very large sum every month. In the past dates have been given for when the Final Investment Decision (FID) will be made but they have never been met. EDF have learnt from this experience and are not giving a firm date for the FID.

In aid of Bridgwater & West Somerset Conservative Association Crowcombe & Stogumber, West Quantocks Branch

Friends of Quantock

We are working with the Quantock Commons Management Group on a scheme that will alter and improve the car parking at Crowcombe Park Gate. There is general agreement on what needs to be done but approvals have to be obtained and funding found to enable the work to go ahead.

Wildlife is one of the glories of the Quantocks and a lot of work is done to monitor the health of different species. The deer are monitored by the Deer Management Group and the RSPB have an ongoing survey of bird species but other bodies monitor bats, dormice and adders and there is a current survey of butterflies and moths. All this contributes to our knowledge of Quantock species and habitats and enables management work to have regard to the impact on different species.

Friends of Quantock will have a stand at the Quantock Show on Bank Holiday Monday, so do come along and talk to us about current projects and issues.

CROWCOMBE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 2nd July 2015. Kate Kenyon was co-opted onto the Parish Council to fill the remaining vacancy. The new Parish Clerk, Claire Morrison-Jones, was welcomed to her role and thanks were given to the outgoing clerk, Jill Loader.

Crowcombe Chest : The Chairman signed the 'Memorandum of Undertaking' for the Crowcombe Chest Foundation between Somerset Community Foundation, who will be overseeing the management of the fund, and the community of Crowcombe. It is planned to distribute leaflets in the village on the 'go live' date of 1st August 2015.

County Councillor's Report : Christine Lawrence stated that she is now the Chair of Somerset County Council. She reported that more funding will be needed for older people, schools and children in care but SCC has to make £20million worth of cuts over the next year – no figures or areas for these have been finalised yet.

Work to clear the gullies at Bagborough Corner has not been carried out as requested, although cats eyes have been installed. There is no scheduled work as yet for the work required to the gullies on the left hand side (Taunton bound) of the A358 'Green Hills'.

The Superfast Broadband issues are continuing – BT have failed to complete phase 1 and SCC have yet to secure a provider for phase 2. Exmoor National Park have secured 'Air Band' to complete phase 2.

Play Area : Two trees were felled in the play area at the end of June. A seat, facing the swings, was made out of the sycamore stump but the lime stump contained a wasps nest so was burnt. It is planned to bring soil up to cover the hole left.

Carters Lane : The overgrown state of the hedge and bank outside the carpark in Carters Lane was brought to the attention of the Parish Council. It was agreed to approach SCC with a request to have it cut back as it is causing a hazard by forcing pedestrians to walk in the road.

Finances to date : Balances as at 22nd June 2015 were : Current a/c £8726.38, Deposit a/c £3222.39, Amenities a/c £2681.74. Balance £14,630.51

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Thursday 3rd September at Church House, commencing at 7.30pm. Draft minutes will be available on the website for more detailed information.

CROWCOMBE CHEST

Crowcombe is a wonderful village and there are many people who would like to say thank you to the village by donating or bequeathing money for the benefit of Crowcombe and it's residents in future years.

The Crowcombe Chest has been set up to make this possible.

It may take some years for the Fund to build to a sum from which it is possible to make donations and grants but when The Fund is of sufficient size, perhaps about £25,000 it is intended that about ten percent of it will be available each year for a wide range of purposes such as:

- Local charities and voluntary organisations working in our community
- Further education and personal development of children and young people
- Hardship support for individuals or families where state funding is not available
- Funding for village events such as street parties or new village amenities like the bus shelters

The Fund will be managed and invested by The Somerset Community Foundation and will be overseen by five Crowcombe Residents known as The Custodians. Initially The Custodians will be Chris Lewis, Jonathan Denton, Dan Davis, Bob Druitt representing The Parish Council and Ben Fawden representing The Parochial Church Council.

There will an annual meeting in November each year to report on progress of The Fund and to select The Custodians for the following year. The date of this meeting will be published in CAW

This is a Fund which will benefit the village for years to come , do support it if you are able.

Crowcombe and Stogumber Federated Primary Schools

A note from Mr. Wedderkopp

It's the end of another jam-packed term, at the end of another amazing year! We've followed migrating swallows, rewritten fairy tales, explored Victorian steamships, visited zoos, camped out under the stars, fired rockets, created Storywalks, visited the sites of London on public transport, hiked the Quantocks, competed in cyclocross, athletics, orienteering country dancing and cricket contests, mapped rivers and fields, raced horses (hobby horses that is!), taken part in Halsway Manor's Golden Anniversary, and made our own Greenscreen movies! And that's the tip of the iceberg!

Here at Crowcombe and Stogumber Primary Schools, we aim to immerse our pupils within a rich and varied environment, linking stimulating activities to challenging tasks and always striving to engage and inspire the children into pushing their own learning on.

Prime examples of this are our end of year overnight camps, which at first glance are simply a walk over the Quantocks, followed by a night out under canvas. The children, however, have to use ordnance survey maps to plan their route to the campsite, the more advanced of whom calculate navigational data such as bearings, distances, altitude changes and journey times. The children learn to risk assess routes, chose waypoints according to their desires and needs (water, views, shelter etc.) and prepare 'plan Bs' in case of weather shifts or accidents. On the hikes they need to navigate by compass, natural signs and by map, consider the needs of their peers and the welfare of the environment, be aware of the weather and the time, and have a great time with their friends, passing through nature. At camp they set up their own tents and bivies, cook their own food and do their own washing up. They go on torchless night walks and often sleep outside their tents, under the stars. They pack up responsibly and always aim to leave the site better than they found it. Back in school we create a 'display in a day' with each child responsible for recounting a certain aspect of our joint adventure. What a wonderful, character building, skill developing, social bonding experience, backed up by powerful English, Maths, Science and Geography learning that the children are motivated and proud to achieve.

This is the ethos of the schooling that we aim to provide here - whether within the classroom or out. We strive to make it relevant and purposeful and we are so lucky to have marvellous, receptive and pro-active children who thrive on it! Teaching is a two way interaction, as much reliant on the pupils' engagement as the teacher's.

So, to end another rich and rewarding year, here are some excerpts of our class recount of Leavers' Camp 2015, the rest of which can be found on the school website, <u>crowcombeandstogumberprimaryschools.co.uk</u>:

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Leavers' Camp 2015: Part 6 - Crowcombe Park Gate

After we had walked through the path leading to Crowcombe Park Gate's car park, torrential rain started to bash down on us! I felt very excited, though I was cold, wet and hoping the rain would stop pouring down!

Mr. Wedderkopp phoned the school office, telling them that we were stuck in the rain and that we weren't going to stop walking.
