**NEWS DECEMBER:** A Very Happy New Year to You All From the W.I. We finished off the old year with our usual party upstairs in the beautiful gallery at the Church House. We all came suitably clad in our glad rags, laden with a plate of food to share, a present for Santa's Sack and another for the Women's Refuge and a very good punch made by members of the committee. Unfortunately our speaker, who was to teach us how to make pot-pouri, was taken ill but we were very fortunate in finding an excellent replacement in Brian Wright who talked to us about the changing ways of Christmas.

Its origins were quite heathen, celebrating not the coming of the Christ but the birth of the sun. King Alfred came up with the idea of the Twelve Days of Christmas. There was so much feasting and drunkenness that in the 17 Century the Puritans banned Christmas altogether! Charles Dickens did much to revive Christmas in his writing of Pickwick Papers and a Christmas Carol which was published on Christmas day. Father Christmas represented the season of Christmas with its jollity, goodwill and the spirit of giving. Santa Claus appeared in England in 1879 and somehow the two became synonymous.

Throughout the centuries Christmas has been evolving with the arrival of the Christmas tree, brought to England in 1841 by Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert. Pretty candles or lights were put on the tree which I like to think commemorates 'The Light of the World' There was always much feasting and drinking and the playing of games. There was a big change in the Sixties with the advent of television but it is still considered a family time and a time for giving and receiving. Let's hope it doesn't get too commercialized and we remind ourselves what Christmas is really about.

Our JANUARY meeting was entitled 'Film Night' and many congratulations to 'Tricia on her choice of film 'Belle' starring Mpapha-Raw. Dido Elizabeth Belle was the child of Maria Belle an enslaved black woman and Sir John Livesey, a British Naval Captain. He was later knighted and promoted to Admiral. Lyndsey took Belle with him when he returned to England in 1765 entrusting her upbringing to his Uncle, William Murray the Earl of Mansfield and his wife. The Murrays educated Belle, bringing her up as a gentle-woman, together with their niece, Lady Elizabeth Murray whose Mother had also died. In his will of 1793 Lord Mansfield confirmed her freedom and provided an outright sum of money and an annuity for her, making her an heiress. It is interesting that in those years William Murray, her great-uncle, in his capacity as Lord Chief Justice,

ruled in two significant slavery cases, one of which he narrowly ruled against the owners of the ship, who he deemed not due insurance payments as the slaves were chained together and dumped overboard during the voyage when the ship ran short of water and that, against popular opinion, the officers were at fault. This is thought by many to be the beginning of the Human Rights Movement. Because of her beauty, accomplishments and intelligence, the younger son of an aristocratic family fell in love with her and they got engaged to the obvious enragement of the elder brother who hated the blacks and was not going to accept the betrothal at any price. Eventually it was annulled. Meanwhile the younger son of a clergyman had also fallen in love with her. He was interested in the Human Rights Movement and was much more up her street. Eventually they married, had two boys and as far as I know lived happily ever after. Oh I do love a happy ending don't you?

#### **Crowcombe Parish Council**

The Parish Council met on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> January 2016 at Church House. The full draft minutes are available on the website for a more detailed description of events, but this report highlights some of the key points covered.

**County Councillor's Report :** Cllr Christine Lawrence, chair of SCC, opened by thanking Crowcombe for the use of the Church for the Chairman's Civic service in November and passed on her appreciation to the Church with all their help, together with a donation to the PPC for £250.

Christine reported on the consultation process on accessible patient transport. There is currently help with transport is available for up to three months after treatment has ceased but moves to reduce funding are being seriously considered. She left some leaflets for placement in the village shop to highlight the issues to the village.

**District Councillor's Report :** Cllr Anthony Trollope-Bellew reported that West Somerset District Council's budget is now balanced for 2016/17 but by the 2018/19 financial year major cuts will be needed.

Anthony informed the meeting that as of the April 2017, West Somerset District Council will not be running public toilets. However it is hoped that most parishes and towns that currently have the facilities will take over their maintenance and upkeep. However more and more facilities will cease to be maintained by the District Council and parishes will have to step in to continue their upkeep. Particular warning was given to the parish of Crowcombe regarding the car park behind Church House and the potential for future resurfacing requirements.

**Councillor Co-option :** Unfortunately the parish Council was unable to co-opt a new member in time for the January meeting so was still below its full compliment of 7 members. However it is hoped to have a new member take office at the March meeting.


**Stogumber Neighbourhood Plan Consultation:** The Chairman provided the background to the Stogumber Neighbourhood Plan. It was noted that Stogumber was the only parish in West Somerset to have currently drawn up a plan. The clerk was requested to write to Stogumber in support of the plan and congratulating them on their progress in the development of their Neighbourhood Plan. Crowcombe will watch their progress with interest.

#### Report from Anthony Trollope-Bellew on West Somerset Council. Happy New Year

The main item for discussion at the moment is the budget for 2016/17. This is going to Cabinet on 3rd February and then on for approval at Full Council on 24th February. We are able to set a balanced budget for 16/17 and the outlook for 17/18 looks manageable. The problem is going to be the budget for 18/19. The cause of this is twofold, firstly, as I have told you before, the reduction in income from Hinkley Point "B" and the "repaying" to government of £1.66 million that we never received. Secondly the underfunding of rural authorities, on average rural councils receive over £100 per head of population in government funding less than urban ones. This gap was small in 1997 but the last Labour government shovelled money into its heart lands. I had hoped that a Conservative government freed from the encumbrance of the Liberal Democrats would correct this injustice. However the latest settlement rather than addressing this problem has made it worse. I know a group of rural MPs under the banner of the "Rural Fairer Funding Group" is up in arms about it. We will have to wait and see whether they manage to obtain a correction.

In the long term the Somerset Rivers Authority (SRA) will be set up as a separate precepting authority similar to the police and fire service. In the meantime government has decided there will be a shadow precept included in the county and district council tax. This means that over and above any other increase the district council tax will rise by £1.76 per annum for a band D property less for lower bands. I cannot tell you what the increase will be in the county council tax. Due to the hard work of various individuals and the West Somerset Flood Board we have received more funding than could have been expected from the SRA. Everybody at WSC will work to make sure that West Somerset receives a fair return for money put in to the SRA. I have always been against increases in council tax but in this case there is no other alternative.

We still await the Final Investment Decision on Hinkley Point " C". But I would be very surprised if at this stage it does not progress.

West Somerset Council runs employment hubs every week between 9:30am and 12.30pm on Tuesdays at The River, West Somerset Children Centre, Williton and on Thursdays at The Sanctuary, Watchet. If you are looking for a job I am told that these are very worthwhile.
